

People visit the hut and attend bhajans and the place becomes a central in the locality. The famous Brahmin astrologer Mr. Shastri too was fascinated by Ammi's presence which shows her strength as a character.

Even after her death he builds up a shrine in her name.

Gudiya: A transition from tradition to modernity

The life journey of Gudiya is one of the full challenges and hardships. She lives a life of a child without parents. They are only her Grand Mother Ammi and later Phoolwati who take care of her. She stands for a transition of a woman from traditions to modernity because earlier though she appears as a traditional woman who supports her husband later there is awakening of a modern woman can be observed at the end of the novel. She is self sufficient without support of her husband Kulki. She accepts every challenge in her life. She becomes a

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role model for the modern generation of women. There is a strong message for women from her character that the women should stand against all adversities independently.

Quest for Identity

The females like Ammi, Gudiya are the victims of the patriarchal system of Indian society where women struggle for their own survival. Still both of them are not just silent sufferers but they rise above from the discrimination and start their successful quest for identity Phoolwati too is another significant character who supports Gudiya like a mentor. She is always there to take care of Gudiya. She runs a stall after her husband's death successfully and sets a nice example for women to survive against setbacks. She is not like the traditional women who are afraid of men and do not raise their voice against them. However, she has courage even to reject the marriage proposal of Sundar Pehalwan, one of the slumlords from the village.
